A MEMORIAL TO A DEAR FRIEND,

James "Jimmy" Allen Way (1937 – 2020) Jimmy was a founding member of the Upper Dorchester County Historical Society. He was also instrumental in the restoration of the Koger House. For almost 2 years, Jimmy did an archaeological dig under the Koger House. The artifacts that he uncovered are on display in the Koger House.

When the Koger House was donated to the society in early 2004, it was in very bad shape from years of neglect and water damage. It was decided early on, to do a restoration, not a

renovation. There were many times a suggestion was made to repair or repaint a tattered area. This did not suit Jimmy.

As I walk through the old treasure even today, I can hear Jimmy saying, "Leave it the hell alone." He loved history and knew that through the history of any old house, there would be updated changes. Ragged or worn, this was its history. He was so right and we did just that; we left it alone. Lucky for us, the old house had very little changes through its years. So much remaining is original.

Jimmy was a historian and a story teller. He loved to dress in period attire whenever an event was being held at the old house. He would share facts about not only the history of the house, but the history surrounding the county. Jimmy drew and sketched mill dams all throughout the county. His drawings were so precise and accurate as he measured each site that you would have thought they were professionally drawn.

Jimmy was a veteran and in the last few years, he was moved to the Victory House in Walterboro. Before he left his beloved home in Dorchester, he told me one day that he had gone to his lawyer and had his will changed. He wanted to leave all of his historical writings, drawings and rare books to the Dorchester County Archives and History Center. After moving into the Victory House all of these items were donated to the center by his family. They will remain in the archives for historians and genealogists to peruse.

I for one miss him greatly. I feel sure he is walking around in his early period attire including his old grey vest with his pocket watch chain hanging out and telling stories to anyone that will listen.
